## MOVING SHAKESPEARE

In this colloquium, through a short series of talks, workshops and performances, we will be reflecting on the ways in which Shakespeare 'moves'. With participants from South Africa and India, one geographical (and geopolitical) starting-point is to think about Shakespeare's movement across the Indian Ocean and, more broadly, the Global South. A second point of departure is to consider Shakespeare's work as expressed in and through movement: from Afrofusion contemporary dance to classical Indian forms such as Kathakali and Odissi. We will also explore movement within Shakespeare's plays in terms of the dynamics between performers and characters – experiments in 'moving parts' and extemporaneous ensemble work.

Puring the course of October, Indian Kathakali dancer, actor and playwright Arjun Raina will be working with South African company Moving Into Pance Mophatong as part of Raina's residency at the Nirox Foundation. The colloquium presents an opportunity to perform and discuss aspects of this collaboration.
